Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

Grace to you and peace! I hope these words find you well in the Lord!

Wow! What words we hear from St. Paul in our 2<sup>nd</sup> Reading this weekend: "Have no anxiety at all" (Philippians 4:6). I don't know about you, but when I hear those words I ask, "Is such a thing even possible?" Well, my friends, "do not be unbelieving, but believe" (John 20:27). As St. Paul mentions a few verses later in his *Letter to the Philippians*, through Christ, we "have the strength for everything" (Philippians 4:13). I don't think it's a coincidence that those words follow shortly after this bold exhortation of St. Paul. Consider too that Christ Himself, in His Sermon on the Mount, repeatedly tells His disciples, "Do not be anxious" (6:25-34). And Jesus' words are not empty words, but words that have the power to effect what they signify. Thus, the ability is there, we just need to exercise it, and we do this through prayer.

Notice the words that follow St. Paul urging: "...by prayer and petition, with thanksgiving, make your requests known to God" (4:6). It is "in relationship with the Lord" that we are delivered from our anxieties, but this takes significant work on our part. We need to continually relate to God throughout our day our thoughts, feelings, and desires, and then, take the time to let Him speak into our interior experience. If we are diligent in this practice, God's peace will surely increase in our lives. "Cast all your worries upon Him because He cares for you" (1 Peter 5:7).

My prayers remain for you all! May the peace of Christ, which is beyond all understanding, keep your hearts and minds in the knowledge and love of God and of His Son, our Lord Jesus Christ!

# **Transition Team Update**

On Wednesday, 9/20, the Transition Team met at St. Augustine for our bi-monthly meeting. One of the first topics of discussion was to address **the Mass schedule post-October**. After some deliberations, it was decided that before we come to a final decision as to how we proceed with the Mass schedule, we need to experience how the Sunday Mass goes at Our Lady of the Holy Cross (OLHC). After a couple weekends of Mass at OLHC, we will have a better idea as to what parishes can best accommodate the fall/winter months and the Advent/Christmas seasons. We expect to have a post-October Mass schedule finalized around the middle of October.

Discussions were then had regarding the **production of a more unified bulletin.** Currently, the weekend bulletin is produced by the parish hosting the Mass for the month. While the information provided within the bulletin is largely the same for all parishes, there are some differences specific to each that we would like to begin to unify (i.e. "Have the front cover represent all four parishes"). A prototype of a new bulletin will be reviewed mid-October. Please note, changes to the bulletin will not affect those who paid for advertisement or memorial space. **Advertisements and memorials will continue unchanged** for each individual parish.

I am excited to announce that a number of faith formation opportunities are beginning to develop in our parishes. The Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA) will begin its inquiry sessions this weekend (10/8) for all those desiring to be Catholic or those in need of the Sacrament of Confirmation. If you know someone who is interested in joining these classes or if you would like to be a part of this process, please notify me or call one of our parish offices. In other faith formation news, a Young Adult/Youth Group/Children's Religious Education leadership team has been assembled to begin helping form our younger generations in the faith. As for ongoing adult faith formation, there was discussion about having a faith formation series on the Mass. The St. Charles Lwanga Center is offering a Bible Study on the Book of Sirach, so the Transition Team suggested offering a series on the Eucharist or perhaps, the Sacraments "in general."

Liturgical minister formation will continue in the coming months. I was able to have two trainings in the month of September: an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion (EMHC) training and an Altar Server training. I apologize for the short notice on these trainings, but the pressing need for these trainings prompted me to schedule them sooner rather than later. There will be additional trainings in the coming months for EMHCs, altar servers, lectors, and ushers. Stay tuned for those upcoming dates.

I am pleased to report that **all our personnel needs have been met!** We now have in place a business manager as well as a maintenance supervisor and additional maintenance help. As mentioned previously, the secretarial duties will be shared amongst the current staff.

In other "Good News," I'm happy to report that a "phone tree" system is being set-up for our four parishes. This will enable us to make important announcements and updates via a phone message that will go out to all our registered parishioners. Communication is of the utmost importance, and the Transition Team and I want to make sure parishioners stay connected in these times of transition.

There was also discussions regarding the need to bring parishioners together for **social events and fellowship**. This will be an ongoing discussion. A Social Committee is formed and they have begun deliberating about hosting a "Trivia Night" in the spring. If you have any suggestions or ideas regarding parish social events or activities, please reach out to one of the Transitional Team members or to me.

New Parish "Name Proposal": St. Benedict the Moor Submitted by Lynn Woolfolk (St. Elizabeth, Mother of John the Baptist)

"A Sicilian Franciscan friar known for his charity work and as the saint of African Missions."

# ST. BENEDICT THE MOOR A Little History

"Benedict was born to Cristoforo and Diana Manasseri, Africans who were taken as slaves in the early 16th century to San Fratello, a small town near Messina, Sicily. They were given Italian names and later converted to Christianity. The Italian "il Moro" for "the dark-skinned" has been interpreted as referring to Moorish heritage.

Benedict's parents were granted freedom for their son before his birth because of their "loyal service". Like most peasants, Benedict did not attend any school and was illiterate. During his youth, he worked as a shepherd and was quick to give what he had earned to the poor. When he was 21 years old, he was publicly insulted for his color. His forbearance at this time was noted by the leader of an independent group of hermits on nearby Monte Pellegrino, who followed the Rule for hermit life written by Francis of Assisi. Benedict was quickly invited to join that community, and shortly thereafter he gave up all his earthly possessions and joined them. He served as the cook for the community and at the age of twenty-eight succeeded Jerome Lanze as leader of the group.

In 1564 Pope Pius IV disbanded independent communities of hermits, ordering them to attach themselves to an established religious Order, in this case, the Order of Friars Minor. Once a friar of the Order, Benedict was assigned to Palermo to the Franciscan Friary of St. Mary of Jesus. He started at the friary as a cook, but, showing the degree of his advancement in the spiritual life, he was soon appointed as the master of novices, and later as Guardian of the community, although he was a lay brother rather than a priest, and was illiterate.

Benedict accepted the promotion, and successfully helped the order adopt a stricter version of the Franciscan Rule of life. He was widely respected for his deep, intuitive understanding of theology and Scripture, and was often sought for counseling. He also had a reputation as a healer of the sick. Combined, these characteristics continued to draw many visitors to him. As he enjoyed cooking, he returned to kitchen duty in his later years.



Benedict died at the age of 65 and, it is claimed, on the very day and hour which he had predicted. At the entrance of his cell in the Franciscan friary of St. Mary of Jesus, there is a plaque with the inscription: "This is the cell where Saint Benedict lived", and the dates of his birth and death – 1524 and 1589. Other sources list the year of his birth as 1526. In a New York Times review of the 2012 exhibit, Revealing the African Presence in Renaissance Europe, at the Walters Art Gallery in Baltimore, Maryland, his birth date is given as 1526.


Upon his death, King Philip III of Spain ordered the construction of a magnificent

#### TIPS TO PRAY THE ROSARY DAILY

- 5. If you are upset, pray for the situation that worries you.
- 6. Pray while you walk and think of the people in your life.
- 7. Use each mystery to ask for a specific intention.
- 8. If you can't pray the whole Rosary at once, break it into parts.
- 9. Say it in moments of sadness or spiritual drought.
- 10. Fall asleep praying the Rosary.


