As the month of October, the month dedicated to the Holy Rosary and to Respect Life, comes to a close, I'd like to thank our St. Augustine (SA) and Our Lady of the Holy Cross (OLHC) locations for hosting our weekend liturgies! As mentioned at the end of Mass last weekend, for the next three months, November through January, all weekend Masses will be celebrated at St. Matthew, the Apostle (SMA). This includes a new Sunday Mass time at 8:00 a.m. After much deliberation and consultation with the Transition Team, I decided that SMA would be best suited to host the coming fall and winter months as well as the Advent and Christmas seasons. Our weekday Masses in the month of November will also be at one location: OLHC. For more information on these decisions, please see the Transition Team Notes located on the following page of the bulletin.

This Wednesday marks the beginning of the month of November and All Saints' Day, a holy day of **obligation.** This glorious feast day celebrates all the saints of the Church, whether they are known or unknown. We will have extra Masses available on this holy day in order for the faithful to fulfill their sacred duty to attend Mass. Options for Mass on the Solemnity of All Saints include: 9:00 a.m. allschool Mass at the St. Louis Catholic Academy school gym located on the campus of St. Elizabeth, Mother of John the Baptist (SEMJB); 12:00 p.m. at OLHC and 6:00 p.m. at OLHC.

The start of the month of November also marks the beginning of Black Catholic History Month. On Sunday, 11/19, the St. Charles Lwanga Center is hosting "A Black Catholic Community's Perspective, Part III: The Black Church – This Is Our Story. This Is Our Song." I hope you can attend! See the bulletin for more details. Also, in the month of November, we remember in our prayers in a special way all the faithful departed (All Souls). Eternal rest grant unto them, O' Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon them! May they rest in peace!

Transition Team Update

On Wednesday, 10/18, the Transition Team met at St. Elizabeth, Mother of John the Baptist, for our bi-monthly meeting. As mentioned previously, the main thrust of this meeting was to have the Mass schedule for the months of November through January finalized. At our previous meeting on October 4th, I asked the members of the Transition Team to start weighing the benefits and limitations of each worship site (OLHC/SA/SMA) now that each site has hosted both a Saturday Vigil Mass and a Sunday Morning Mass. St. Elizabeth, Mother of John the Baptist, for the time being, was not included in these deliberations due to the church being in disrepair. As I talk more with the Archdiocesan leadership regarding the state of the SEMJB church building, we will know the extent of its future use as a worship site for our parish family.

So, the first part of our meeting consisted of discussing the worship experience of each parish. We analyzed each worship site according to various factors: accessibility (especially for those with disabilities/limited mobility), accommodations (bathrooms, choir space, social gathering capabilities, etc.), audio/visual capabilities, HVAC reliability, parking, seating capacity, security, etc. We also took into account some of the various challenges that lie ahead in the coming months (i.e., preparing/maintaining decorations throughout Advent/Christmas season; fall/winter weather [ice/snow]).

After weighing these factors, we discussed which site would work best as the primary weekend worship space for the months of November through January. I wanted one location for our weekend

liturgies because there seems to be a growing need for stability with our merger. After receiving input from each member of the Transition Team, I decided that **St. Matthew, the Apostle** would be the best option for the coming months. **Remember, this decision holds only for the coming months.** Until we get through the appeal process and know more fully the status of St. Elizabeth, Mother of John the Baptist as a possible worship site, we can't make a final decision regarding the primary place of worship in our merger. In addition to the above decision, I decided to add an additional Sunday Mass option at 8:00 a.m.

As for the **location of weekday Mass**, again, there seemed to be a need for stability. For the month of November, Tuesday through Thursday Mass will be at the Our Lady of the Holy Cross location. Monday Mass will remain an all-school Mass (St. Louis Catholic Academy) celebrated in the school gym of St. Elizabeth, Mother of John the Baptist. **I'd like to further discuss with the Transition Team how St. Augustine can be incorporated into the daily Mass schedule.** If you have input, please reach out to me or to a member of the Transition Team.

After deciding upon our Mass schedule, the Transition Team reviewed a rough draft of a **unified parish bulletin**. Look forward to seeing the new look of our bulletin in the coming weeks! In other news, our **Liturgy Committee** is beginning to meet to discuss the new liturgical year beginning with the Advent season in December. Also, plans are underway with the **Social Committee** for a large-scale, spring social event as well as other smaller community-building gatherings in the coming months. These will be announced at Mass and in the weekend bulletin as well as through other social communications so please pay attention to those sources. As a reminder, **take advantage of the opportunity to meet with your fellow parishioners and me at our open-forum Monday meetings**. Sign-up with one of our parish secretaries or with me for any Monday evening (10/30-11/20). Our final Monday meeting for the month of October (10/30) will be located at Our Lady of the Holy Cross at 5:00 p.m. The remaining Monday meetings in the month of November (11/6, 11/13, 11/20) will be located at St. Matthew, the Apostle at 5:00 p.m. We are limiting the number of participants to 15 so please call in advance to sign-up.

New Parish "Name Proposal": Father Augustus Tolton Submitted by: Lynn Squires

HISTORY OF FATHER AUGUSTUS TOLTON

"Father Augustus Tolton was the first freed black slave from the United States to become a Catholic priest. Born in Missouri on April 1, 1854, Augustus was born into slavery. There are indications that their owners freed his family at the outbreak of the Civil War.

Although Augustus and his siblings attended Catholic schools, they were subjected to situations of cruelty and racism because they were black. At the age of 16, through teachings on the Eucharist and the Sacrifice of the Mass, Augustus heard his call to priesthood.

Due to the fact that U.S. seminaries wouldn't receive African-Americans, it was not until 1880 that Augustus was accepted into a seminary in Rome. He believed that once ordained he would serve as a missionary and be sent to Africa, however, Cardinal Giovanni Simeoni insisted that the United States had to see the first black priest. He then obediently returned to work with the black community in the U.S., the place where he was most persecuted. He was assigned to serve as a missionary in Quincy, Illinois.

Father Augustus soon became well-known for his beautiful homilies, his voice and his talent when playing the accordion. His effectiveness as a preacher and spiritual leadership began to attract large numbers of white people who attended his Masses to hear his sermons at St. Mary's Catholic Church in Chicago, something that his fellow white priests didn't like. Despite all the challenges he had to face during his apostolate, Father Augustus never gave up and accepted the cross he had to carry for being the only black priest in the country.

Father Augustus never spoke in public about the racism he suffered from his fellow Catholics. Instead, he taught that Catholicism has always welcomed the different races, since one of the wise men, who Father Augustus called "a negro king," was one of the first ones to greet the newborn Savior. He also preached that the Catholic Church was the only true liberator of blacks in America. He died on July 9, 1897, at the age of 43, of a stroke during a heat wave in Chicago.

He was named Venerable by Pope Francis on June 12, 2019. (By **Denver Catholic Staff** November 14, 2022)"

OTHER CHURCHES WITH THE SAME NAME

"A brief search did not return results indicating that there is a church with the same name. Ours would be one of the first, if not the first, and most fitting given his current path to Sainthood and local connections. Legacies that do honor Fr. Tolton include:

- ⇒ The Father Tolton Regional Catholic High School that opened in 2011 in Columbia, Missouri. https://vimeo.com/736174313
- ⇒ Augustus Tolton Catholic Academy opened in the fall of 2015 in Chicago, Illinois.
- ⇒ Holy Name of Jesus in North St. Louis County dedicated a shrine in Fr. Tolton's honor in 2021. Some of the other churches that commemorate Father Tolton include Blessed Teresa of Calcutta Church in Ferguson, which has a large portrait of him, and St. Alphonsus Liguori (Rock) Church in St. Louis, which has a statue of Father Tolton. In 1887, Father Tolton met the Redemptorist community at St. Alphonsus Church and celebrated Mass for the School Sisters of Notre Dame in the convent chapel. The St. Charles Lwanga Center has the icon framed on a table with prayer cards. (Joseph Kenny, St. Louis Review)"


